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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Situated in the district of Nadia, the opening of Government General Degree College Nakashipara in 2015 marked the realization of the long-held aspiration of the people in the village of Muragachha of Nakashipara block. Beginning with a modest 150 students, the college commenced its operations on April 2015 with just a two storeyed building. The college is affiliated to the University of Kalyani since its inception. Though a budding institution, the college aims to uphold a set of well defined social, cultural and institutional values and objectives that have been defining its existance for the last 8 years.

From the very beginning the college received approval for Honors programs in 4 Arts subjects, such as, Bengali, English, Education and History, from the affiliating university. Currently, the college offers undergraduate courses with majors and minors across 18 departments spanning both science and humanities disciplines. The most striking feature of this institution since its inception has been to impart education, across the barriers of religion, community, class and gender.

The College has always reviewed, redefined and modified its Mission to keep pace with the changing social and national imperatives. As an institution under the State Government, the College aims at achieving its Mission, through transmission of knowledge and skill and imparting a value-oriented education to its students. Since its inception the college has received several prestigious awards like the champion of the Youth parliament Competition at the district, division as well as state level competition.

The IQAC of the College keeps a vigilant eye to assure quality upgradation, and a newly formed Alumni Association also aims to offer its valuable support towards the enrichment of academic and extra-curricular activities.

The College, till date, has maintained its academic standard, as evident in the results and placement of students in public and private sectors.

Institutional Strength

STRENGTH

- Geographical position the College is situated at a remote and so far not very wellknown village. This otherwise disadvantageous factor can also be considered hugely advantageous. Firstly because, there are ample opportunities of development of the adjacent locality onto which the College can play an active role and secondly, the calm and peaceful environment- which is ideal for taking classes and examinations.
- Renowned for high-quality academic programs and rigorous curriculum.
- A dedicated team of experienced and highly qualified faculty members.
- Well-equipped laboratories, classrooms, and extensive library resources.
- A diverse student population, fostering cultural exchange and understanding.

- Active participation in community services and social initiatives.
- Pleasant relationship between the students teachers.
- The college offers additional and certificate courses beyond the regular curricula to provide all students with enhanced opportunities.
- Collaborative activities facilitated by Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) and partnerships with various expert institutions aim to offer multi-disciplinary practical knowledge upgrades. These also foster critical thinking and innovative learning approaches for all students.
- The academic achievements, including graduation rates, progression to higher education, and job placements, are commendable. Additionally, students receive awards and recognition for their achievements in both curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Institutional Facilities:

- Provision of clean and purified drinking water.

- High-speed internet and multiple ICT-enabled rooms.
- Barrier-free environment with wheelchair accessibility, ramps, and accessible washrooms.
- Computer lab facility
- E-Learning Management System complementing traditional classroom teaching.
- Indoor games facilities

- Seminar halls and auditorium for hosting various events like seminars, workshops, conferences, meetings, and cultural programs.

- Environmental initiatives include tree plantation, maintaining a plastic-free campus, and waste management in collaboration with a waste management company.

- Feedback from stakeholders analyzed for continuous improvement.
- A strong alumni network actively involved in social, academic and cultural activities.

Institutional Weakness

- Since this is a Government Institution, so by dint of the procedure of transfer as per the rule of the service if occurs in the middle of an academic session, becomes a problematic issue especially in regard to the completion of syllabus, particularly in the CBCS strategy of college education.
- As the institute lacks academic autonomy at UG levels, its contribution in curriculum designing and modification is negligible. However teachers as members of Board of Studies fill up this gap to some extent.
- The College is yet to have a spacious auditorium keeping in mind the numerous cultural activities being organized at different parts of the session.
- The College is yet to have its own playground. The college is dependent on the Muragachha High School play ground for various sports activities.
- Library automation is to be fully completed. This may become possible with increase in Library staff.

• Lab based science departments don't have any laboratory assistants.

Institutional Opportunity

- Formation of in-house, inter-disciplinary and external academic linkage through collaborative projects and research activities could be enhanced in course of time.
- Horizontal and vertical expansion of the facilities within the departments with increased support from the State Government will attract brilliant students for enrolment in the College.
- Extension activities under the umbrella of active NSS is already in progress. But the areas of activities can be expanded further.
- The College has still barriers in utilizing the fallow landed assets which can be utilized for more infrastructural development.
- Process for opening some new departments can be initiated with the support of the Government.

Institutional Challenge

The primary challenge the College faces today is to retain and reflect the unique legacy of the College in its curricular and co-curricular activities. At the same time, the Institution is gearing itself towards the future, with a vision to encompass emerging disciplines and areas in higher education thereby creating global academic ambience.

- Obtaining permissible funds for different development programmes.
- Teaching is incomplete without supplementing research. Research enhances the quality of teaching and involving students in research activity is a potential method of enabling them to understand the truth and reality of the subject. A significant number of teachers are actively involved in conducting research works and also publishing their original research articles in reputed journals and books. It is a challenge before the College to maintain this spirit.
- Academic planning for UG is entirely dependent on University of Kalyani although it welcomes propositions. Keeping up with the trend is a challenge.
- Upgradation of status and more independence will require for structural and statutory changes.
- The academic performance of the students is good, yet there remains further scope for improvement. The challenge is to retain and enhance the quality of performance.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- At the undergraduate level, the college offers eight Honours courses and two Program courses: B.A. and B.Sc.
- College adheres to the curricula set by the University of Kalyani. The college's faculty members serve on the university's Board of Studies, assisting with curriculum development and modification as needed.

- The parent university's academic calendar is closely followed, and the college creates its own academic calendar in accordance with it.
- Teachers of the various departments take part in the workshops and seminars that are arranged by research organizations and universities. In order to better themselves, teachers also take part in career-oriented courses provided by UGC.
- Based on suggestions from IQAC, the academic departments of the institution have launched a number of value-added courses from the academic session of 2018-19. The add-on courses are an immediate success and the institution plans to incorporate more such courses in the academic structure.
- The curriculum covers a variety of cross-cutting problems, such as Professional Ethics, Gender Sensitization, Human Values and Environmental awareness, with a focus on the curriculum of History, Education, English, Political Science and Bengali and the works of NSS Projects are included in the curricula of several departments, such as Chemistry, Mathematics, English, and Bengali etc., to develop the critical bent of mind of the students.
- The college has also introduced an LMS portal where all the academic related documents such as teaching plan, co-po, e-study materials etc are shared with the students. A feedback mechanism is in place that is tailored for each stakeholder and is regularly evaluated in order to identify the areas for improvement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Efforts are consistently made to uphold high standards in this crucial aspect of the college education system, despite facing evident challenges.
- Complete transparency is maintained in all matters concerning the admission process, which is conducted online through a dedicated portal.
- Prior to the commencement of actual teaching, department-wise Induction programs are organized to warmly welcome all first-semester students.
- Any grievances related to the admission process are handled with meticulous attention by the designated admission committee.
- The admission guidelines from the parent university (University of Kalyani) are strictly adhered to, as are the government directives regarding reservations for various societal sections (SC, ST, OBC, minority, etc.).
- More than half of the seats designated for students from reserved categories are filled.
- The needs of differently abled students are carefully addressed.
- The institution endeavours to personalize the Teaching Learning process, placing a strong emphasis on student-entered approaches that are further refined through feedback mechanism.
- The college boasts a highly skilled teaching faculty, with all of them having NET/SLET qualification, and approximately 65% of instructors have Ph.D qualifications.
- In addition to adhering to the university's evaluation procedures (University Semester Examinations), the college has established its own evaluation system through continuous Internal Examinations from the session 2018-19.
- To facilitate this process, the main college website is going to have a dedicated page, as does the Learning Management System (LMS) utilized by the college.
- These platforms will be equipped with functionalities to store questions from both University examinations and internal assessments.
- In the past five years, the performance of our students in University examinations has consistently remained strong, averaging at a healthy percentage.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- While the primary objective of the College remains the delivery of quality education, the institution also holds a broader vision to cultivate a robust research culture among both faculty and students.
- A dedicated research committee actively encourages and supports teachers and students alike to participate in research processes.
- To bolster research endeavours, the college library is undergoing revitalization to better cater to the needs of researchers.
- Additionally, departments host Seminars, providing a platform to engage with distinguished scholars from other institutions, fostering a culture of intellectual exchange and collaboration.
- The Research Committee encourages faculty participation in a variety of academic events such as Seminars, Symposiums, Refresher and Orientation programs, aiming to broaden their horizons and stay abreast of latest developments in their fields.
- The college holds a strong commitment to social responsibility, regularly organizing programmes to raise social awareness. Noteworthy initiatives such as Blood-donation drives and Dengue Awareness campaigns with the support of NSS have garnered significant appreciation from the local community.
- Over the past three years, the college has successfully initiated several Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) with various organizations, aimed at enhancing opportunities and benefits for the student community. These collaborative efforts signify the college's dedication to holistic development and the advancement of its students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college campus spans 5 acres and includes 22 functional classrooms. All the departments have their individual classrooms.
- The department of Chemistry has 3 different laboratories for the three branches of the subjects namely Organic, Inorganic and Physical. On the other hand, the Physics department has three laboratories for Mechanics & Heat, Optics and Electronics related experiments. For all the Science departments a designated Computer laboratory, fully air-conditioned is also established.
- The college features a modern air-conditioned seminar hall equipped with contemporary amenities.
- For hydration needs, the college can claim to have installed several water purifiers across the campus. The college has recently upgraded its WiFi facilities. Furthermore, there are individual parking areas catering to both staff and students.
- The college has WiFi-enabled projectors and an LMS portal where the teachers can upload study materials and video lectures for the students to access them fully.
- To ensure security, the college premises are under constant CCTV surveillance, further enhancing safety and monitoring capabilities. Even some of the classrooms are CCTV enabled.
- The college operates a central library, diligently catering to the needs of the students. . The library is in the process of automation and as of 2022, the college has adopted Koha, an open-source software solution, to further streamline library operations.
- In addition to a fully functional canteen for both the boys and girls, the college provides separate common rooms for both genders. Furthermore, the college has taken steps to enhance hygiene and convenience by applying to the Higher Education Department for the installation of sanitary napkin vending and disposal machines.
- To promote cleanliness, numerous waste bins are strategically placed throughout the premises to collect all types of trash left by students and staff. The college places a strong emphasis on maintaining its infrastructure, ensuring that all equipment is diligently cared for.

Student Support and Progression

- The institution's leadership focuses on motivating and inspiring students to avail themselves of various State Government Scholarships such as Kanyashree, Aikyashree, Swami Vivekananda, etc., benefiting a wide range of students regardless of gender, caste, or other categories.
- The Career Counseling and Guidance Centre plays an active role in placing students and providing soft skills development training, facilitated by Right Brain Technologies which has led to employment opportunities for many students. Additionally, different departments offer Add-on Courses to equip students with special skills in their individual field of studies.
- The Students' Grievance Redressal cell remains vigilant in assisting students with any issues they may encounter while studying at the college. The Anti-ragging Cell and Bishakha are proactive in preventing incidents of ragging and sexual harassment, with no such incidents reported to date.
- Post-graduation pursuits are common among graduates, with many securing admissions into prestigious programs and others qualifying in exams such as NET, and GATE. In Youth Parliament Competition students demonstrate notable performances at district and state levels.
- The cultural wing of the institution organizes a variety of cultural programs, observes national holidays like Independence and Republic Days, and commemorates the birthdays of eminent personalities. As mentioned earlier, Students excel in cultural competitions like Mock Parliament, showcasing their talents.
- The alumni association, despite its relatively short existence, has made significant contributions to the institution. The alumni are actively involved in several programs of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The institution's vision and mission are forward-looking, aimed at meeting the educational needs of learners within a changing socio-economic landscape by providing quality education.
- In addition to the core curriculum, various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are designed to enhance students' personalities and develop skills that ensure employability.
- Regular value-based lectures are integrated into the class routine to instill moral values among students.
- Environmental awareness is actively promoted through initiatives such as Green Audits, Plantation programs, and other environment related activities designed by the NSS unit of the college.
- As a government institution, the administration adheres to regulations set by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal, and the statutes of the affiliating university, University of Kalyani.
- The Officer-in-Charge serving executive head of the institution oversees all the administrative as well as academic operations. The Teachers' Council and the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) are also overseen by the Officer-in-Charge.
- Budget allocations from the State Government are disbursed by the Principal to different departments and committees for expenses such as books, equipment, and other necessities. Financial management is supported by the Cashier appointed by the Higher Education Department and the whole process is subjected tor egular financial audits.
- The institution maintains a feedback mechanism involving students, employees, and guardians, informing policy decisions for future years. The IQAC plays a pivotal role in institutional development, scheduling regular meetings with departments to review progress. Additionally, an Academic Audit has been introduced to strengthen the teaching-learning process, essential for academic excellence.

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Furthermore, the college has introduced job oriented training courses, which span multiple disciplines which might be beneficial for their future. The entire course structure plays a vital role in preparing students for future job markets. Similarly, the NSS unit actively engages students in activities that foster social responsibility and citizenship beyond disciplinary boundaries. In essence, Government General degree College Nakashipara's efforts underscore its commitment to holistic education, ensuring that students are well-equipped not only academically but also professionally and socially to meet the challenges of the future.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Government General Degree College Nakashipara, affiliated with the University of Kalyani, adheres closely to the directives issued by the university. Recently, in response to the university's notification (Ref.No. CoE/ABC-ID/2/U.G/2023), which informed all stakeholders about the university's registration on the ABC platform, Government General Degree College Nakashipara was directed to follow suit. In compliance with this advisory, the college promptly notified its students to register on the portal. As a result, a significant majority of students have already completed their registration process on the ABC platform.
3. Skill development:	Our institution recognizes the importance of skill development for students to thrive in their future endeavors. Response:

The institute adheres to the curriculum laid down by the affiliating University of Kalyani. The college innovates within the given academic structures to provide holistic development for its students. The Academic Council executes the task of preparing a well planned academic calendar, holiday list at the beginning of each academic session and duly uploads the same to the college website. All the departments maintain their individual CO-PO for all the existing semesters. Internal assessment is carried out in a well planned and documented process. Apart from engaging themselves in continuous internal examination, the teachers of the college are also actively involved as evaluators for University examinations. The departments also prepare lesson plans of their own before the commencement of every academic session. The routine committee ensures effective implementation of curriculum by preparing a well-structured routine for each semester. The college has a LMS portal where all the E-materials are shared and the students can access them with their individual log in ids. The college also has effective library facilities that are helpful for both teachers and students. All the academic departments strive to raise consciousness of students about ethics and morality through a well structured Value Education curriculum. Academically Core Courses, Generic Electives and Skill Enhancement Courses are offered across various departments of Arts and Science stream to help students critically examine issues related to gender, environment, and ethics. Seminars highlighting the prevalent discrimination on adolescent health on the basis of gender in India and the gap between legal assurances of gender equality and its violation in actuality are conducted where students can converse with lawyers. Other activities like preparation of wall magazines, tutorial classes help the students to engage in self development in a creative manner. Observance of World Environment Day, organization of Blood Donation Camp, cleanliness drive and several other programs by planned by the NSS unit of the college has been regularized in the institute. 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

Our college follows the curriculum designed by the undergraduate board of studies of the University of Kalyani, hence it does not have the mandate to design its own curriculum. However, within its permitted range it integrates cross cutting issues into the teaching of its curriculum. The intellectual environment of the college, it's academic, administrative, and social and culture practices also contribute in this regard.

- 1. **Professional Ethics:** Professional Ethics is included and addressed in UG syllabi of various disciplines. Humanities studies of UG course like Bengali, Political Science, and English cover ethical issues. The IQAC has organized a state level webinar 'Ideology of Swami Vivekananda and the youth of present era' related to Value Education.
- 2. Gender Issues: All the UG courses in humanities have the components related to gender studies, gender sensitization. It brings into focus the challenges faced by women. Syllabi of different subjects like Bengali, English, Education, Political Science, and History are incorporated in such a way that gender issues become part of the curriculum. Students can acquire knowledge about women's empowerment, their basic rights violence against women, protective laws, protests and movements through the syllabi of History and Political Science.

Seminars are organized to sensitize students on this area. In this institute there is an ICC cell, under Gender sensitization and sexual harassment committee which organizes lectures related to such topics. There is also a grievance redressal cell, to address such issues.

1. **Human Value:** Academically, core courses and other courses offered under subjects like Political Science, History, Education, and Bengali critically examine issues on human values. The value oriented curriculum provides opportunities for self-development, sincerity, honesty and hard work.

The NSS week is observed every year by the NSS unit of this college. In this programme students are involved with social works, helping backward people. The NSS unit also conducts value

education programme annually.

The departments of literature of our college like Bengali, English teach texts which have brought forth deeper appreciation of human values among the students.

History and Political Science departments deal with concepts related to human rights, social structure, constitution of India and provision for protection of human rights.

1. Environment and Sustainability: The curriculum of Bengali has within it a paper on Eco-Criticism and its reflection on Bengali literature. This part of the syllabi focuses on different dimensions of Environment ranging from eco texts to pollution control and many other such facets.

Mandatory environmental studies course is included in Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course under the CBCS curriculum.

Political science and History provide topics on history of Indian environments. It focuses on the theories of environment and ecological development in India. This syllabus serves as indigenous knowledge systems like social formation and collective management of rivers, forests, hills in pre-colonial India.

The NSS unit is active on the forefront for promoting environmental welfare and celebrated events like world environment day, cleaning activities and plantation programs every year.

Project on Environmental Studies helped the students to gain practical knowledge on environmental issues.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

Government General Degree College, Nakashipara had taken several **Lerner-Centric initiatives** to make teaching-learning process more effective. Some learning methods based on psychological foundation like **experiential learning, participative learning, peer tutoring, project based learning, problem solving method** and others were implemented successfully.

Experiential Learning:

- 1. Two days field trip to a place of historical importance was organised by the Department of History and Education to build proper insight and real experience with the Exploratory thinking among the learners.
- 2. Students conducted **institutional survey** to collect data from nearby educational institutions.
- 3. College also conducts career counselling programme regularly.
- 4. Community Engagement and Extension activities have been carried out by the NSS.
- 5. Department of Bengali has shown **Film and documentaries** on different syllabus-related topics to the students.
- 6. Department of Bengali has conducted **project-based activities** and inaugurated **wall magazine**.

Participative learning:

- 1. In participatory class learners make **group discussions** under the **facilitation** of the concerned teacher.
- 2. College has practice of **Student Profile Mapping** to determine the **abilities of students** in an **objective and quantifiable manner** and identify the **slow and advanced learners** so that appropriate support can be provided by the institution.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Government General Degree College, Nakashipara has designed its Internal Assessment evaluation process in accordance with University circulars. From the Academic year 2018-19, CBCS was implemented by the University, before this there was annual system of examination. For the year 2018-19 and 2019-20, internal evaluation has been conducted for both year wise system and semester system.

- Before final examination an **internal test** was conducted by each department of the college for the students admitted in 2016-17 and 2017-18 **to make learners aware about their preparation.**
- Internal assessment was taken for the students admitted from the academic year 2018-19 and onwards, i.e. under CBCS system. Here, **20% of the total marks** were allotted **for internal examination** and the remaining **80% of the marks** were allotted for the **semester end examination**.
- One-third of the **20% of marks given for internal evaluation** for specific disciplines are **allocated for attendance**, with the remaining scores going toward internal examinations or projects.
- Total Marks for internal assessment is 15 for the Core Courses (CC), Generic Electives (GE) and Discipline Specific Electives (DSE) and 10 for the Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC).
- Internal Examinations' related Notifications are circulated by the Internal Examination committees and they conduct all Internal Assessments in a centralized way.
- Notifications relating to End Semester Examinations, Admit Cards, Schedules, Centre allocation lists, published by the University, are notified in the College website.
- Practical Examinations are held by the Departments themselves.
- The Internal, Practical Marks is preserved by the Departments and uploaded in the University portal as per the notification issued by University time to time.
- Any complaints from students regarding the **university-level end-semester exam** are communicated by the college to the university administration.
- If a student is unhappy with their grades, they can request to **the University for review** (**presently in online mode**), through proper channel.
- The students have the options for registering their grievances related to Internal Assessments and End-Semester Examinations through both the Offline and Online modes. The students can collect the Offline form from the Grievance Redressal Committee (GRC) and lodge their individual grievances. On the other hand in case of online mode the student can lodge a by filling up the Google form available in the college website in a specified format. The GRC convenes meetings based on it, involving the student(s) along with the connected parties to immediately solve it.

Attainment of Programme outcomes and Course outcomes are evaluated by the institution. Attainment of

course outcomes is obtained by Direct Method (80% of CGPA) and Indirect Methods (Teacher's Assessment).

1. Direct methods:

i) Continuous Internal Assessment: In strict adherence to the guidelines of the University of Kalyani, apart from the end-semester examinations, GOVERNMENT GENERAL DEGREE COLLEGE, NAKASHIPARA conducts internal examination of 15 marks consisting of attendance of 5 marks and Internal Assessment (IA) of 10 marks. Departments ask students to prepare project files on specific topics, and ask to presentpapers on topics related to their disciplines, which are preserved in the departments.

ii) End-Semester Examination Performance Analysis: Grades obtained through informative and summative evaluations are the direct measures of attainment of Specific Course Outcomes (COs). Marks as obtained by students at every semester end and at the end of the entire course are a way to exemplify the pattern of achievement that the course had to offer.

2. Indirect Methods:

i) Feedback mechanism: The college practices robust feedback mechanism for the maintenance of the existing standard as well as upgradation of the overall teaching learning ambience. Feedback from students, alumni and employer is taken in every academic year for this purpose. The IQAC evaluates student's feedback on teacher's performance regarding concept delivery, timely completion of curriculum assigned, evaluation etc. This is analyzed and discussed with the College authority and the Head of the Department. The students' feedback is taken separately on syllabi and the overall institutional provisions assigned. A report on these feedbacks is even featured on the college website.

ii) Holistic development of students: Teacher's aim is to instill in their students a curiosity about the world around them and the ability to adjust to changes in both their academic field and environment. Additionally, they play a crucial role in helping students develop their leadership abilities as well as their professional and personal skills.

iii) Student's progression: An important parameter of measurement of outcome of the programme is the progression of the students to higher levels of education in various institutions of the state and the country (about 75 students in last 5 years). Students passing out from the college after completion of the UG programmes (90.65% in last 5 years) pursue their Postgraduate degrees in various premier institutes of the nation. After postgraduation, students of our college join prestigious institutes for Ph.D programme. Moreover, some of the students qualify for JAM, GATE, NET, WBSET, and other competitive examinations as conducted by the Central or State Agencies.

iv) **Placement and employability:** Employability and placement are two vital indicators of POs and COs. Our students are benefitted by Career counseling arranged by the Career counselling Committee. For, success in competitive examinations and entering the job market requires considerable knowledge of the subject as well as power of critical thinking and logical analysis. Our students get placement in the Government Sector, Private Sector, Defence, West Bengal Police Sub Inspector and in fields of research.

Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS),including awareness about IPR, establishment of IPR cell, Incubation centre and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology and the outcomes of the same are evident

Response:

Government General Degree College, Nakashipara has created an ecosystem for innovations through collaborative activities of different academic departments and committees with the IQAC through its various activities.

The relevant academic curriculum covered under the UG CBCS program of our affiliating university provides a scope to the students to inculcate the Indian knowledge system. The prescribed syllabus of History, Education and Political Science departments have multiple sections covering the salient aspects of the Indian knowledge system. We have made the students constantly aware of the importance of creative works and innovation, and our duty as responsible citizens and academicians to be aware of the values they inculcate.

In the newly prescribed UG CBCS program (w.e.f. 2018-19 academic session), many departments have

incorporated mandatory or optional short research project as a part of the curriculum. Our faculties have regularly made the students aware of the importance of maintaining academic sanctity and citing proper references while writing research projects. The IQAC, in collaboration with other stakeholders of the college has also taken initiative to organize seminars on the importance of IPR.

The projects on the mandatory Environmental Studies has given the students ample opportunities to explore the neighboring areas of ecological importance like the Bethuadahari Reserved Forest or the river Ganges and its various branches. Project activities are also given to the learners to build problem solving ability among them. This college initiates research activities to build up exploratory minds among the learners.

Despite the institute currently lacking 2F and 12B approval from UGC, it is difficult for our faculties to receive any funding for any minor research project. Nevertheless, the institute always encourages the faculties to pursue Ph.D. research works and/or collaboration activities with other institutes as much as possible.

To build proper understanding on research activities and also to develop skills among the learners Dept. of Education initiates application of psychological tools like standardized Test Anxiety Scales by the learners.

To generate awareness among the learners on education system Institutional Survey is also carried out by the learners under the guidance of faculties of Dept. of Education.

Students are also motivated to make term paper through document or content analysis collected from secondary sources.

The college regularly organizes faculty exchange programs with nearby institutions for better transfer of academic knowledge amongst the student for their betterment. For a recently established college, our central library as well as the departmental library with more than five thousand books allows the students to enrich their knowledge in the broader areas of academics. The central computer lab with high speed internet allows the faculties and the students to access e-resources for effective learning.

College Building and Land Area:- Our college is situated on 5 Acres of land area. College has a total of two buildings (One is main building for academic and administrative work, and the other is Students' Activity Centre).

Classroom: - College has a total of 14 theoretical classrooms and 7 science Laboratory

Course offered:- College offered total 8 honours and 2 programme courses.

Laboratory:-

- Chemistry department has a total of 3 laboratories (Physical Chemistry, Inorganic Chemistry and Organic Chemistry and one Chemical store room).
- Physics department also has 3 laboratories (Optics, Electronics and General Lab).
- Mathematics department has a computer lab with 15 computers.
- 1. Free WiFi facility is available inside the college campus.
- 2. Separate departmental classroom with seminar library facilities for each department is available.
- 3. College has one fully furnished ICT enable auditorium hall for organizing cultural programs. It is also used for various academic purposes.
- 4. Our college has Learning Management System named as 'ESHIKSHAK'.
- 5. NSOU Study Centre caters to the need of distant learners.
- 6. College has tactical path for Divyangan (Specially-abled persons) on the ground floor.
- 7. College has two modern photocopy machines. One is situated in office for administrative work and another is situated in library for student use.
- 8. Our college has Semi-automated Library equipped with cloud based koha-ILMS. More over the college provides additional services like OPAC web.
- 9. All the departments have their own departmental libraries.
- 10. College library is WiFi enabled. College has a separate reading room for students and teachers in the library with AC facility. College has a total of more than 5500 books.

- 11. Our college library serves institutional repository along with OER repositories like, e-Sodhganga, SodhSindhu, epgpathshala, IGNOU e-GyanKosh, Swayam, UGC-MOOCS, INTERNET ARCHIVE etc.
- 12. The college is under CCTV surveillance. There are a total of 28 CCTV installed in various important places for security purposes.
- 13. College has fire exhaust system in building.
- 14. Water purifiers with water cooling facility are there in the college for students.
- 15. College has two rooms equipped with ICT classroom facility.
- 16. College has a total of 27 computers, out of 24 computers are dedicated for students use .
- 17. The college has a Canteen which is a source of refreshment.
- 18. College has separate garages for student and staff use. Total 3 shades of cycle garage are present for students' use.

Sports Facilities:- College has no playground but college annual sports is conducted every year on the nearby school playground. There are in-campus facilities for different indoor games like chess, carom etc.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

Government General Degree College, Nakashipara always tries to improve the IT facilities in the campus for the benefit of the students. The following measures have been undertaken for the said purpose:

- 1.To maintain a sustained IT facility in the campus, the institution installed internet facility purchased from Alliance Broadband to provide LAN facilities along with adequate Wi-Fi facilities with 70-100 MBPS network speed.
- 2. Online processing of all student-related activities such as university registration, form fill-up for examinations, generation of admit cards and mark sheets, uploading of marks on the university web portal, etc.
- 3. There has been a significant increase in the number of desktops and laptops during the last five years. At present, there are 27 computers, among them 24 Desktops are dedicated for students' use, 3 desktop for office use. All computers are connected with high speed internet.
- 4. Two modern photocopy machines are there for the purpose of the Office work and the other one for the students.
- 5. The College has a well-maintained website where notices, affairs including admission and university examinations, NAAC-related information etc., are available.
- 6. Auditorium room is equipped for conducting virtual classes.
- 7. Departments uses free software for teaching learning like Origin, Python, GNU Plot, octave c, C++ compiler, UNIX (UBUNTU), Turbo C compiler, MS; Avogadro, Mercury, Pimole.

The perspective plan document is an important component of the college strategy development and deployed process. This college being a Government College functioning under the purview of Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal, the administrative set up, appointment, Service rules and policies are followed by the guidelines set and issued by the Higher Education Department from time to time. The faculty members of this institution belong to the cadre of West Bengal Education Service (WBES) and the officer-in-charge also belongs to the cadre of West Bengal Education Service (WBES). Their Recruitment process is executed by the public service commision, West Bengal according to the guidelines of the UGC. However their appointments in colleges and subsequent transfer to other Government colleges are decided by the Department of Higher education, Government of West Bengal. Consequently, service rules of the faculty members, likewise the teaching and non teaching members are governed by the WBSR . However their CAS benefits are determined as per UGC guidelines and executed by the Department of Higher education, Government of West Bengal.

At the beginning of the academic year various bodies and committees that the organogram of the institute chalked out A plan of action on the basis of Teaching learning process, curricular and extracurricular activities, infrastructure development, enrichment college activities etc. The quality policy is reviewed through principal visits and meetings with departments. Academic and administrative audits by IQAC also help in achieving its objectives .The IQAC has reviewed and revised the quality policy with the help of teaching, non teaching staff, students, alumni and other stakeholders of the institute. The Head of the institute guides the faculty to implement all activities effectively. The Head of the institute maintains good relationships with stakeholders for the development of the institute.

The teaching learning process is looked after by the academic committee of college. The convener of the academic committee convenes academic committee meetings involving almost all the teachers on a regular basis where all the issues related to teaching learning are discussed in detail and then it is forwarded to IQAC of the college.

Since this is a full-fledged Government Institution under the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal, the teaching and non-teaching employees of the institution likewise other state government employees enjoy the following benefits:

There is a provision of on duty leave for the faculty members for participation in various Faculty Development Programme.

Employees of the college can avail festival advance before their prime festival.

Some employees also get Bonus from the State Government before Durga Puja, the most celebrated festival in West Bengal.

All the employees of the college are entitled to avail the benefits of Home Travel Concession (HTC) in every five years and Leave Travel Concession (LTC) in every ten years.

Being government officers, all the faculty members of the college submit three tier online Self-Appraisal Report (SAR) in each financial year through IFMS portal of Government of West Bengal. For this each teacher has to log-in the IFMS portal and has to insert various data or information related to attendance in college, leave taken, basic teaching learning assignments performed and other academic and administrative activities executed by the teacher concerned inside and outside of the College during that year. Thereafter, each teacher has to forward this SAR to the Reporting Officer, i.e., officer- in- charge after necessary examination send this to the Reviewing Officer, i.e., Director of Public Instruction (DPI), Govt. of West Bengal and ultimately, Special Secretary of the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal accepts it as Accepting Officer. In this process, if any discrepancy is found at any stage, then it is returned ultimately to the teacher concerned and the above process is repeated sequentially. However, for non-teaching staff, the officer- in- charge looks into the matter in consultation with the Head Assistant of the Office.

The institution keenly supports its teaching and non-teaching staff to avail various opportunities for career development or progression.

o Allows faculty members to attend various courses like Refresher Course, Orientation Programmes and Short-term courses as per UGC guidelines not only essential for their career advancement but also for their academic enrichment

o Provides financial assistance to faculty members to attend various academic or administrative conferences/seminars.

o Provides NOC to the faculty members for pursuing in service Ph.D which later facilitates their career progression.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

In order to utilize resources optimally, the Convener, Purchase Advisory Committee after collecting the departmental requisitions convenes a meeting in the presence of the Principal of the college for rational utilization of the financial resources as per the requirement. The Purchase Advisory Committee then prepares a budget taking into consideration the suggestions of the IQAC Committee in concurrence with the Officer-in-Charge. Finally it is submitted to the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal. This is also supplemented by the non-plan budget prepared by the college office in consultation with the Principal. The Government of West Bengal grants annual allotment for non-plan requirements in due time and also allots Development Grant to the college to meet the various needs of the college. This process is followed by the path of inviting tender quotations, placing work orders and finally supply of articles by the vendors for the effective and efficient use of the financial resources.

The audit & assessment actually review whether the existing mechanism of the financial systems is according to the norms and if there are any deviations in this mechanism they recommend for improvement of the process. Accordingly, the college makes every attempt to ensure internal and external auditing of the funds received by it from various governmental and non-governmental sources. Internal audit is performed by the Registered Chartered Accountant firm with the assistance of the Internal Audit and Assessment committee after which the Utilization certificate is prepared for being sent to the funding agencies. The Heads of the lab-based Departments and the librarian of the college look after the laboratory and library stocks respectively. The college office is instrumental in submitting IT and GST returns regularly within stipulated time. The External Audit is generally carried out from time to time.
